MoDOT, in conjunction with the Cities of Liberty, Kansas City, and Pleasant Valley, is extending Flintlock Road in the cities of Kansas City and Liberty. The study corridor, approximately 0.8 mile in length, would connect Flintlock Road at 76th Street in Kansas City to Liberty Drive in Liberty. This project is currently a draft Environmental Assessment, to be completed by the City of Liberty.

Two properties of interest under Section 4(f) lie within the project limits. The first property is owned by the Liberty Public School District #53, and contains two schools. The second property belongs to the Clay County Department of Social Service, Division of Health. There are no recreational facilities improvements in MoDOT's encroachment areas. Since these properties are primarily managed for non-recreational, non-wildlife refuge purposes, we request your concurrence that Section 4(f) does not apply.

Thank you for submitting information concerning the above-referenced project for our review pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (P.L. 89-665, as amended) and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation's regulation 36 CFR Part 800, which require identification and evaluation of historic properties.

After reviewing the information provided we find the report to be adequate. It is our opinion the erosion control structure and site 23CL1453 are not eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places.


With regard to the possible cemetery. The report indicated that a cemetery is or was present and it was likely destroyed or buried by fill. While it is still our opinion that further work will need to be done to determine if a cemetery is or was present at this location, it is clear that will not be done. Therefore, respectfully request that this portion of the project area be monitored during construction. If cultural materials and or human remains are encountered during construction work will need to cease in the vicinity and local law enforcement notified as per the regulations related to R.M.S. Chapter 194 the unmarked human burial law.

Please be advised that, if the project area is increased or adjacent areas that may contain significant cultural resources may be adversely impacted, appropriate information must be provided to this office for further review and comment.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide preliminary information during preparation of the Environmental Assessment (EA) for the Flintlock Road overpass project. The department's comments on this proposed project are provided below.

Water Resources

Examination of digital information regarding surface water resource geography within the study corridor revealed Little Shoal Creek and an unnamed tributary, plus riverine and palustrine NWI wetlands associated with the riparian corridor of Little Shoal Creek and the aforementioned unnamed tributary. Project planners will need to consider anticipated impacts on these and any other identified water resources.

Park and Cultural Resources

The proposed project does not affect lands under the department's jurisdiction. However, because the department administers the federal Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) program, it has the responsibility for ensuring that all local parks funded through LWCF are protected. Parks funded through the LWCF program must be managed for the public in perpetuity and may only be used for outdoor recreation activities. Although, from the maps provided, there do not appear to be any parks affected by the project, in order to receive clearance for this project, all local parks funded through LWCF within the proposed project boundary must be identified in the Environmental Assessment and any impacts to those parks determined. Similarly, no cultural resources were identified using the information provided, but the project

planners will need to meet requirements of the Section 106 review process, in order to avoid or mitigate any impacts to cultural resources.

Geology

The IMOP (Inventory of Mines, Occurrences & Prospects) database indicates a WPA-vintage quarry located in the SW ¼ of the SE ¼, Sec. 14, T. 52 N., R. 32 W. This quarry may exist within the study corridor boundaries. Since the Liberty 7.5' Quadrangle was published in 1965, and the quarry is not shown on the map, the quarry may be filled with unknown materials that could cause an unstable substrate. Further investigation during project planning may be warranted.

Currently, there are no faults or other structures mapped in this area. However, the area has not been mapped in great detail, so the potential exists for previously unmapped structures to be present. The presence of limestone indicates that karst may be present in the area. This possibility should be considered during project planning, as caves or other voids may exist in the project area.

Hazardous Waste

Attached for your information is a list of underground storage tank sites in the Liberty area where a release has occurred.

This e-mail responds to your letter of May 6, 2005 regarding the proposed Flintlock Road project in Liberty and Kansas City. Thank you for including EPA in your early coordination and for providing the project description and maps.

In assessing the project I referred to EPA databases to search for regulated activities and environmental remediation activities. I did not find any site or activity within your project study boundaries that would have a bearing on the proposal. Please recognize that the Missouri Department of Natural Resources may have more recent or complete information about environmental constraints within this study area.

As a recommendation, I would urge you to set the study boundaries for the socioeconomic, and cumulative impact analyses at a greater distance from the work zone, given that the project is liable to induce growth.

Dear Mr. Scott:

The Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) is initiating an environmental study for the Flintlock Road overpass at I-35 in the cities of Kansas City and Liberty, Missouri. The study corridor, which is approximately 0.8 mile in length, extends from NE 76th Street to Liberty Drive. The project is a cooperative effort of MoDOT, the city of Kansas City, the city of Liberty, the Liberty School District, and the Economic Development Corporation of Kansas City. The project will consist of a two-lane roadway in each direction. The overpass is a MoDOT project, with the approach roadway being funded by Kansas City on the west side of I-35, and Liberty on the east side of I-35. The proposed action is to provide a north and south system linkage by constructing an overpass of I-35 along the extension of Flintlock Road. The proposed linkage would connect Flintlock Road at 76th Street in Kansas City to Liberty Drive in Liberty. Currently no connection exists between these two segments of roadway. The primary purpose of the proposed project is to provide more direct access to and from the residential, commercial, and educational activity centers on either side of I-35. Little Shoal Creek, which is located adjacent to the project area, would be crossed (bridged) by the Flintlock Road project at 3 different locations, and retaining walls will be used where appropriate to minimize impacts to the creek.

HNTB Corporation is currently working as a consultant for MoDOT and the cities in the preparation of an Environmental Assessment for the project. Enclosed are a USGS map and an aerial photo base map showing the location and extent of the study corridor. We are in the process of gathering environmental data and would appreciate input from the USFWS relating to any issues, concerns, or existing agency data that we should be aware of within the study corridor, in order to help us in the planning process.

This is in reply to your letter requesting comments regarding the proposed Flintlock Road Overpass near Liberty, Missouri. The project study area is located along Little Shoal Creek on both sides of Interstate 35 in Kansas City in Sections 14 and 23, Township 51 north, Range 32 west, Clay County, Missouri.

The Corps of Engineers has jurisdiction over all waters of the United States. Discharges of dredged or fill material in waters of the United States, including wetlands, require prior authorization from the Corps under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act (33 USC 1344). The implementing regulation for this Act is found at 33 CFR 320-330.

Should the proposed improvements require the discharge of dredged or fill material in any waters of the United States, including wetlands, a Department of the Army (DA) permit may be required. However, if the proposed improvements do not require the discharge of dredged or fill material in any waters of the United States, including wetlands, a DA permit will not be required. If wetland fill or work within jurisdictional waters of the U.S. is proposed, a delineation of the affected waters along with a complete application should be submitted for consideration by this office.

Federal regulations require that a DA permit be issued by the Corps of Engineers prior to the initiation of any construction on the portion of a proposed activity which is within the Corps' regulatory jurisdiction.

We very much appreciate the opportunity to comment on the Missouri Department of Transportation (MODOT) Project in the City of Kansas City and the City of Liberty, Missouri. Please accept this letter as comment on the proposed plan.

The State of Missouri is a participant in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). Any development associated with this project located within a special flood hazard area (SFHA), as identified by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), must meet the requirements of the State of Missouri Executive Order 98-03. This would require obtaining a floodplain development permit for the proposed project. This permit must be obtained prior to the commencement of any construction/development activities. This permit would be obtained from this agency.

If the proposed development is also located within a regulatory floodway, a "No-Rise" Certificate and statement as to the effects of possible flooding, is required before the development can be permitted. This analysis must be performed by a licensed engineer and to current FEMA standards.

This agency *did* provide federal funding to the City of Liberty to purchase properties, which are deed restricted. Enclosed is a listing of those properties. This agency *did not* provide any federal funding to the City of Kansas City, Missouri to purchase property.



This is not a site clearance letter, but a report of Missouri Department of Conservation records concerning public lands and sensitive resources known to be near and possibly affected by the proposed project.

Species/habitats with Federal restrictions: No Records Found

Species/habitats with State restrictions: No Records Found

Concerns & management recommendations¹ based on site or project details, not related to specific heritage records: Indiana bats (*myotis sodalis*, Federally endangered, State endangered) roost and raise young under the bark of trees in riparian forests and upland forests near perennial streams. During project activities, avoid degrading stream quality and where possible leave snags standing and preserve mature forest canopy. Additional information to incorporate in planning documents is available at <http://www.mdc.mo.gov/documents/nathis/endangered/indianabat.pdf>.

Habitat loss can impact populations of grassland birds native to the area, including barn owls (state endangered), northern harriers (state endangered), Henslow's sparrow (imperiled in the state), and greater prairie-chickens (state endangered). Revegetation with native grasses and other flowering plants will minimize the impact of habitat disturbance. Best management practices may be found on-line at <http://www.mdc.mo.gov/nathis/endangered/bmp.htm>.

The project area occurs in a region of karst geology, characterized by subterranean water movement. Features like caves, springs, and sinkholes are common. Cave fauna are influenced by water pollution and other changes to water quality. Every effort should be made to protect groundwater in the project area. See <http://www.mdc.mo.gov/documents/nathis/endangered/karst.pdf> for best management information.

Road projects typically change the plants and animals that live on the right-of-way or in the vicinity. That becomes a conservation issue if it impacts species or habitats of conservation concern, including streams. Road construction is otherwise a concern to local, state and federal regulatory agencies which may require permits or practices that protect public interests including fish and wildlife resources. Fish and wildlife concerns are minimal here if construction is managed to minimize erosion and sedimentation/runoff to nearby streams and lakes, including adherence to any "Clean Water Permit" conditions.

Revegetation of disturbed areas is recommended to minimize erosion, as is restoration of shoulder areas with native plant species compatible with the local landscape and wildlife needs. Annual ryegrass may be combined with native perennials for quicker green-up. Avoid aggressive exotic perennials such as crown vetch and sericea lespedeza.

Based on that information, the review provides information about species and habitats of concern that could be affected by the project. Heritage records note things that were positively identified at some date and time, marked at a location that may be more or less precise. Animals move quickly but plant communities can move also. To say "there is a record" does not mean the species/habitat is still there. To say that "there is no record" does not mean the project may not encounter something. Because of this, reports include information about records near but not necessarily on the project site. Three different kinds of information are provided.

- **"Species/Habitats With FEDERAL RESTRICTIONS"** lists species that have been known to exist near enough to the project site to warrant concern and protected under the Federal Endangered Species Act. For these, project managers must contact the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Ecological Services (101 Park Deville Drive Suite A, Columbia, Missouri 65203-0007; Phone 573-234-2132; Fax 573-234-2181) for consultation.
- **"Species/habitats with STATE RESTRICTIONS"** lists species known to exist near enough to the project site to warrant concern and protected under the Wildlife Code of Missouri (RSMo 3 CSR 10). "State Endangered Status" is determined by the Missouri Conservation Commission under constitutional authority, with requirements expressed in the Missouri Wildlife Code, rule 3CSR10-4.111. "State Rank" is numeric rank of relative rarity, protected under general provisions of the Wildlife Code.
- **"Concerns & management recommendations"** are things one might prudently look for at the identified site, but of which we have no specific record. With 93% of Missouri land in private ownership, most sites in Missouri have never been carefully inspected by conservation professionals, but our knowledge of the surrounding landscape suggests that the project consider these items.

With all of the above, we attempt to provide information to help the requestor determine if the species is actually on site, and available best management recommendations.

This report is not a site clearance letter. Rather, this letter provides an indication of whether or not public lands and sensitive resources are known to be (or are likely to be) located close to the proposed project.

Incorporating information from our Heritage Database into project plans is an important step that can help reduce unnecessary impacts to Missouri's sensitive natural resources. However, the Heritage Database is only one reference that should be used to evaluate potential adverse impacts. Other types of information, such as wetland and soils maps and on-site inspections or surveys, should be considered. Reviewing current landscape and habitat information and species biological characteristics would additionally ensure that species of conservation concern are appropriately identified and addressed.
